


Media monitoring trends from 2017 to 2024

CRTA: Increase in pro-Russian narrative since 2023, with a continuously pronounced anti-Western tone

CRTA: Positive tone of reporting on China remains high, with a brief decline in 2020, while coverage of the West has remained consistently negative since 2017



CRTA: Methodology


- Timeframe: January September 2024
- Sample:
 - Newspapers: Blic, Informer, Kurir and Večernje novosti
 - Online portals (articles published from 17h up to 23h): blic.rs, b92.net, kurir.rs and novosti.rs
 - TV: Central News and press cliping segment on Morning Shows on RTS 1, TV Pink, TV Prva, and Happy TV
- Unit of analysis: mentions in media pieces
- Sample Size: 22,201

• *Topics of analyses:* Politics, Military, Economy, Kosovo, Past conflicts 1990-99, Culture, Human Rights, Health.

CRTA: US and Russia dominate headlines with nearly identical frequency of mentions in 2024



CRTA: Negative portrayals significantly outweigh the more positive portrayals of Western entities




CRTA: Across the board, Western actors are more often portrayed in a negative light, while China and Russia stay in the green

Number of mentions in media pieces



CRTA: Anti-West coverage dominates. Pro-Russia narrative consistently tops the pro-West narrative, except during visits by Chancellor Scholz and president Macron; pro-Russian peaks around Russian elections





CRTA: Anti-West narrative dominates; a sharp increase in pro-China coverage during the Chinese President's visit to Serbia






CRTA: Russia and China positively portrayed on all the most important topics, while EU is portrayed positively on economy




CRTA: Anti-Western sentiments dominate the realm of information manipulation
